Misery and Mercy

Some people have difficulty with today's gospel story about the woman accused of adultery. They feel that it demeans women. Others like it because the hypocrisy of the Pharisees is exposed. But neither perspective focuses on the principal message of this gospel, which is not about the status of women nor the evil of the Pharisees. It's about the mercy of God offered to sinners. It's about us.

Some scriptural background will help place this gospel in proper perspective. The story is not in some of the early gospel manuscripts. Scholars agree that it was a real event in the life of Christ, but it presented a difficulty are basic themes of Luke's gospel.

So what are we to learn from all of this? The lesson to reflect on was expressed well by St. Augustine, who said of this gospel passage that at the end of the story only two remained: misery and mercy. The woman and Christ: misery and mercy. This gospel story is about every sinner's need for the mercy of God. Not a frivolous mercy implying a free pass for any transgression, but a mercy which moves the sinner to repentance.

The main point of any gospel story is often the closing verse, the punch line. In today's gospel that verse is, "Go, and from now on do not sin any



for the early church. The problem was the ready forgiveness of adultery which, along with murder, were the two gravest sins for the first Christians.

So the ancient copyists of manuscripts dropped it, or moved it to different gospels. Although we are in the liturgical year C when we read from Luke, today's gospel is taken from John. This passage is currently placed in John's gospel, but in the past it was found in the gospel of Luke. And that was done because the forgiveness of such a serious sin is more compatible with the compassion and mercy that more." Mercy offers forgiveness, but forgiveness is effective only in the repentant. Today's gospel message is not unfair the treatment of women nor the hypocrisy of the Pharisees,

although both are very true. The lesson is that the mercy of God should move us to

a repentance which includes a firm intention to improve our life. Only then are we truly forgiven.

These final days before Holy Week focus on repentance as the fruit of our Lenten penance. This is an opportune time to examine our conscience and prepare for a good confession that we may know the mercy of Christ offered in the Sacrament of Penance.

St. Joseph Faithful Protector of Mother and Child

The infant Christ "came into our world in a state of great vulnerability. He needed to be defended, protected, cared for and raised by Joseph" (PC 5). The humble and often hidden carpenter of Nazareth accompanied Mary in her pregnancy, assisted at the birth of the Messiah in a stable, presented Jesus in the Temple, fled with his family far from their homeland to protect them, and lovingly raised Jesus as his own son in the years to come.

While the angel of the Lord appeared to Mary to announce that she would bring forth the Savior of the world, it was revealed to Joseph in a series of dreams how God's plans would be brought to fulfillment. As Pope Francis highlights, "God trusted Joseph, as did Mary, who found in him someone who would not only save her life, but would always provide for her and her child" (PC 5).

Dear St. Joseph, help us to imitate your faithful trust and courage. Like every other human family, the Holy Family had to confront real and concrete challenges. Yet, "in every situation, Joseph declared his own 'fiat" (PC 3). His "yes" to the Lord meant that regardless of the hardship and personal sacrifice to himself, he consistently chose to put the needs of Mary and Jesus before his own. Joseph's devotion helps reveal to us our own call to show special care for the lives of those whom God has entrusted to us.

During this Year of St. Joseph, each of us can find in him "an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble" (PC, Intro). Joseph shows us how to say "yes" to life, despite our own fears, frailties, and weaknesses. For it is Joseph who was "chosen by God to guide the beginnings of the history of redemption. He was the true

'miracle' by which God saves the child and his mother" (PC 5).

May we, too, be miracles in the lives of those who are most in need, especially at the beginning and end of life. Dear St. Joseph, you who were "able to turn a problem into a possibility by trusting always in divine providence" (PC 5), help us to imitate your faithful trust and courage.

The Eucharistic Miracles of the World exhibit is a traveling display featuring 56 beautiful panels that highlight some of the most powerful Eucharistic miracles in the world. These Vatican-approved miracles have been created by an Italian teenage, Servant of God Carlo Acutis. Carlo died from leukemia the year after he completed this project.

Blessed Carlo Acutis

Blessed Carlo Acutis was born May 3, 1991. He spoke his first words at 3 months.

By the age of 4, he showed a great interest in Jesus and the Virgin Mary. Carlo held Jesus as his first priority. He and his mother brought food and blankets to the homeless. He rounded up his friends to help with this.

By the age of 9, he became interested in computer programming and bought college textbooks to teach himself how to code. Carlo began a website that displayed the Eucharistic Miracles of the World.

When Carlo was 15, he was diagnosed with leukemia and in a very short time was in much pain. A week after his diagnosis, on October 12, 2006, he died-a year after completing his Eucharistic Miracles project.



PRESS RELEASE — BISHOP JOHN BRUNGARDT

March 23, 2022

Archbishop Joseph F. Naumann of the Archdiocese of Kansas City in Kansas today announced that Bishop John Brungardt will be resuming his duties as the Bishop of the Diocese of Dodge City. Bishop Brungardt does so after a 14-month period during which he stepped aside after an allegation of sexual abuse was made against him. Bishop Brungardt voluntarily withdrew from public ministry to facilitate the investigation of the allegation. During that period, the allegation was fully investigated by the Kansas Bureau of Investigation (KBI), following which civil authorities declined prosecution.

Following the KBI investigation, Church authorities conducted their own separate investigation of the allegation. The Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith at the Vatican, has now determined that the allegation against Bishop Brungardt is not supported by the evidence and the case against him has been dismissed. Bishop Brungardt has vigorously denied the allegation throughout, and he fully cooperated with both the civil and Church investigations. Throughout this entire 14-month period, Bishop Brungardt has been entitled to the presumption of innocence under both civil and Church law.

During Bishop Brungardt's voluntary absence, Bishop Gerald Vincke of Salina served as the Apostolic Administrator of the Diocese of Dodge City. Bishop Brungardt has expressed his gratitude to Bishop Vincke for his many months of service to the faithful of the Diocese.

Now that Bishop Brungardt will be taking up his duties again, he also expressed his appreciation for the thoroughness of both investigations and is eager to resume public ministry, "serving Almighty God and the good people of the Catholic Diocese of Dodge City." At the same time, Bishop Brungardt urges everyone "to pray for and listen to all victims of sexual abuse."

April Is Child Abuse Prevention Month

We are called through scripture and teaching to protect the life and dignity of the human person.

Throughout the year, but especially in the month of April, we all are asked to increase awareness, to educate ourselves and the community, and to seek healing for those who have been so tragically impacted.

In order to prevent child abuse, we need to understand what it is.

Child abuse is when a child is intentionally harmed by an adult or another child-it can be over a period of time, but it can also be a one and done action. It can be physical, sexual, or emotional and it can happen in person or "on-line". It can also be a lack of love, care, and attention—this is called neglect.

NEWS AND NOTES from the Safe Environment Office

Parenting can be tough, and caring for a child is one of the most important jobs a parent has, this includes keeping a child safe from harm. Unfortunately though our children don't come with instruction manuals. So as parents we need training. The more training we have the more prepared we will feel as we raise our children and the more able we are to handle upsets and surprises. Connecting on several levels with your children will go a long way in preventing abuse. See the list below for ways to connect with your child so when a situation does arise you are prepared to handle it. For more information and resources visit www.faceitabuse.org

- CALL FOR HELP : We can all use a helping hand sometimes. Reach out for help when you or your family needs it. No matter what is going on in your life or the lives of your family members, it is helpful to be prepared with local hotline information in case of a crisis or emergency.
- OFFER ONE ON ONE OPPORTUNITIES: Schedule one on one time with each of your children even if only for 5-10 minutes each day. Normalize that it is okay to not be happy all the time. Help your child take note of the times that you and your family are happy. It is normal to have good days and bad days.

NAVIGATE YOUR NETWORKS: Use community resources like schools, libraries, neighbors and more to connect to people and places that can provide support to your family. Many are available through online platforms.

NOTICE TRIGGERS AND TAKE BREAKS: Learn which behaviors and words that might help you identify your child's impending meltdown or tantrum. Remember, children and teens react (in part) based on what they see from the adults around them. When you are calm, you provide the best support.

EAT TOGETHER: Family meals create opportunities for sharing about the day, catching up, and discussing highlights and struggles. Get your kids involved in preparing meals, not just eating the meals you prepare. Cooking together can bring a family together.

CARE FOR YOURSELF: Caregivers cannot pour from an empty cup, so it is important to take care of yourself too. Practice self-care. Listen to your favorite song, read, meditate, or enjoy your favorite activity. When we can take time to care for ourselves, we are in the best form to care for those we love.

TAKE TIME TO TALK: Find time to talk with your child about their friendships, what they enjoy doing, and what they want to do when they grow up. Instead of asking questions like, "how was your day", try asking questions like, "what was your favorite part of today?" or "if you could do today over, what would you change?"

The church is the Body of Christ. All members of the Church are linked to one another. We ALL have a responsibility to ensure the safety of children in our parishes, schools, families and local communities. The Diocese of Salina has taken great strides in fulfilling our promise to protect children, educate our communities, and bring healing to those who have suffered abuse. Are there people who sit next to you at mass each week who do not currently minister to minors, but could benefit from being educated on how to protect children? Please encourage them to contact the Safe Environment Office - 785-827-8746. The more people who are educated on child sexual abuse, the safer our children will be!



SAFE ENVIRONMENT PROGRAM

All those who minister to children or young people on a regular basis are to be educated about the nature of child sexual abuse, how to report it, and strategies for prevention. The Diocese of Salina currently uses a program called CMGCONNECT, a web-based, on-line training program (along with an integrated background check) that specializes in helping churches, schools, and religious organizations create safe environments for children and youth. High School students in grades 9-12 who work with other minors on a regular basis will do their own training through CMGConnect, which covers safe and appropriate ways to interact with other children.

BEFORE beginning any ministry with children in your parish or school, you must have Safe Environment Training and it must be current (taken within the last 5 years).


